Dr. Allen stays engaged in her subject year round. Below are some other endeavors in which she was involved in 2018-2019:



BECOMING "DR." BYRD

Roger Byrd, part-time instructor in the area of social sciences, is a lifelong learner who embodies all that it means to seek knowledge. In 2018 alone, Mr. Byrd added three feathers to his educational cap.

- 1. He received his M.S. in Criminal Justice from Georgia Southern University;
- 2. He received a graduate certificate in cybercrime from Armstrong Atlantic University; and
- 3. He defended his dissertation, "Secondary Education and Offender Recidivism in Georgia: An Analysis of Perspectives of Community Supervision Officers," to successfully complete his Ed.D. at Valdosta State University, officially becoming Dr. Roger Byrd.

Since that time, Dr. Byrd has worked to combine his knowledge-base in the criminal justice system with his newly-acquired degree in education. In November 2018, Dr. Byrd presented a paper at the Georgia Political Science Association Annual Conference entitled, "Throwing Away the Key: Missed Opportunities in Corrections Education."
